



The purpose of the visit was to provide the students with practical exposure to an industrial setup, and to gain first-hand knowledge of the manufacturing process and functioning of the company.

At the outset, students were provided with safety kits to ensure adherence to the company's safety protocols inside the manufacturing setup. Then, the officials at PepsiCo explained the detailed process of manufacturing, covering various stages involved in production. They were then given a tour of the various units of the factory, to help them form a clear idea about the various procedures behind the manufacturing of the products of the company. An interactive session was also conducted, during which the students actively participated and had their queries answered by the company representatives.

The field visit was highly enriching as it provided practical insights into industrial operations and helped the students relate their classroom knowledge to real-world applications.



The Grade XII students of TKS visited the AI Lab at Bharat Forge on 25th of September, for an educational trip. The objective was to understand how artificial intelligence (AI) is used in various sectors such as manufacturing and education, and to observe live demonstrations at the AI Lab. The students observed the applications of Virtual Reality (VR) and Augmented Reality (AR), in modern industries like training, product development, and simulation. They also got an insight into how these technologies are being used for product design, employee training, remote collaboration, and even customer engagement. The students saw the real robots in action, and learnt how they are built, programmed, and used in workplaces, and how robots are used in industries to improve speed and safety.

Forever Forward

A very informative and interesting workshop was conducted for the students of Grades XI and XII on 26th of September, titled, 'Marketing Unplugged (Sales 101)', by Mr. Snehadeep Kayet. The objective was to challenge and reframe the overwhelmingly negative stereotypes associated with sales, and to establish sales as an essential, universal life skill applicable to everyone.

The session began with an interactive question to surface attendees' immediate, raw perceptions of sales. The four Sales Personality Types (The Problem Solver, The Storyteller, The Relationship Builder, The Knowledge Guru) were introduced. The session underscored the philosophy: "never sell the product, always sell the feeling". Teams of students were assigned a task to "sell the unsellable" by merging the identities of two brands, McDonald's and Burger Singh. The students were actively involved in the given challenge, and brain-stormed relevant strategies to solve it. While engaged in the task, they understood that sales is a pervasive life skill. They learned the three-step process for sales interaction: Ask, Listen and Feel.

The 'Sales 101' session provided a comprehensive introduction to the fundamental principles of sales, moving beyond the negative connotations of the practice. The culminating group activity, focused on fusing brands and selling the 'un-sellable', and reinforced the core message of selling the emotion or feeling. rather than the mere features of a product.



The students of Grades IX and X attended a workshop on Suicide Prevention Awareness, on 30th of September. The programme was organized by Pastoral Care Department, in the respective classrooms. The primary goal of this initiative was to raise awareness, reduce stigma, equip students and educators with the right tools, and foster a resilient and compassionate school environment where no student feels alone. The students were made aware that conversations about emotional well-being and seeking help, are necessary when one feels unhappy, or are in pain. The facilitators provided strategies to recognize warning signs and ways to act responsibly. they ensured that everyone knows where to go for help within the school system and beyond. The presentation challenged myths surrounding suicide and reinforced that suicidal thoughts are not attention-seeking behaviors but distress signals that demand compassionate attention. The key lies in observation without judgment and reporting concerns immediately. The session also introduced the A.C.T. model (Acknowledge-Care-Tell) as a practical framework. The overarching message of the session was one of hope and reassurance. It highlighted that by embracing open communication, recognizing warning signs, and fostering resilience suicide risks can be reduced and a nurturing environment can be created for every student.
