The session was led by Dr. Keerthi Pai, a renowned Clinical Psychologist, from Chennai Element H, who emphasized the importance of integrating DBT techniques in school environments to support students' emotional regulation, distress tolerance, and interpersonal skills. The workshop concluded with a Question and Answer session, where Dr. Pai addressed challenges related to implementing DBT in different school environments and discussed ways to create an informed school culture.
